

How to create a new document

Often with Adobe Photoshop, you start working directly with an existing image. At other times, you might prefer to start with a blank document for a particular purpose, or require a set of exact specifications for your project. In this guide, you'll review two quick and easy ways to create new Photoshop documents. The first is to use a provided set of blank document presets and templates from the Start workspace. The second allows you to define an exact set of specifications for image dimensions, resolution, color type, size, and other details.

Creating a new document using presets

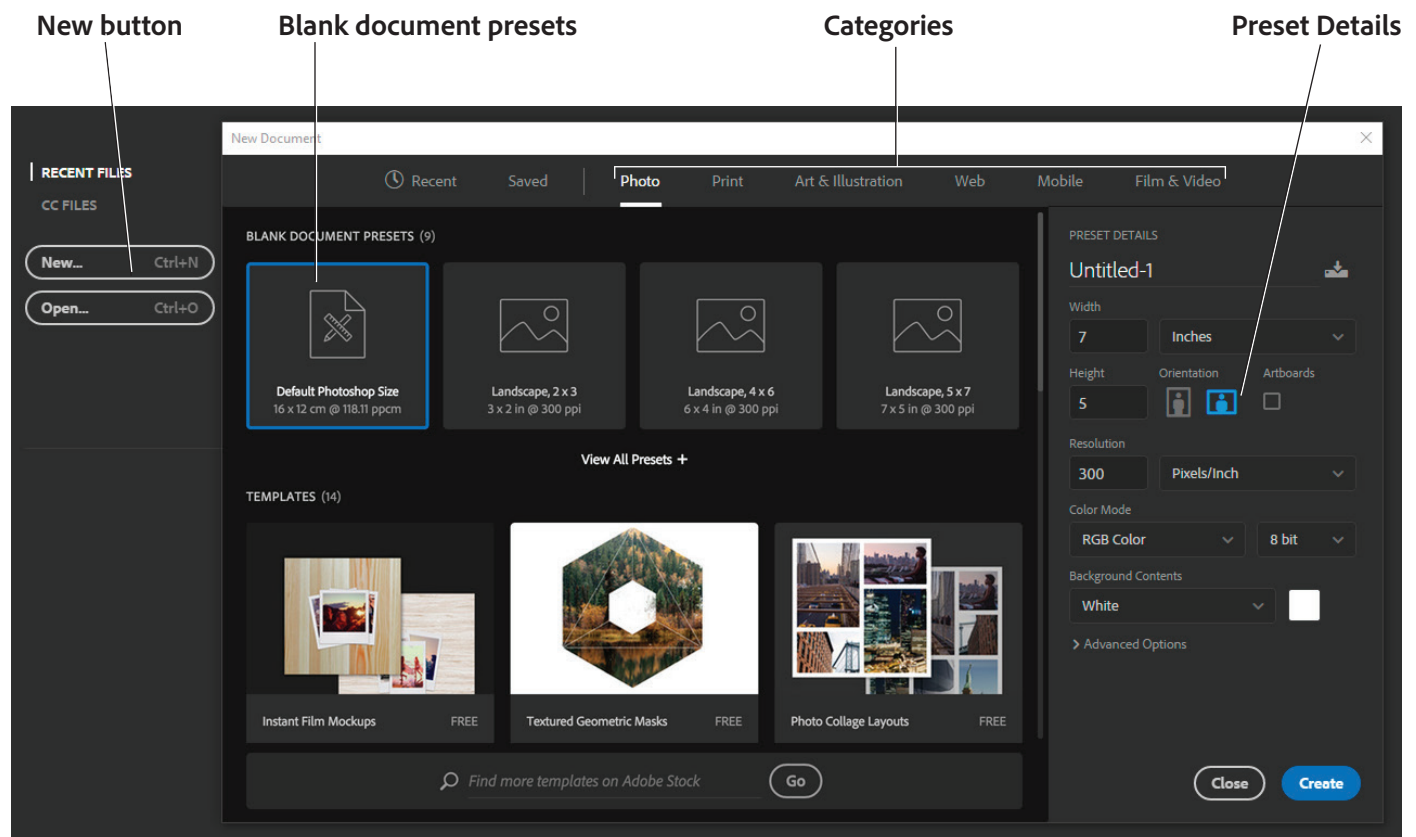


Figure 1 The Start workspace, with New Document dialog box

The Start workspace gives you quick access to your recent files, libraries, and presets. When you click the New button, the New Document dialog box opens and displays options for various blank document presets (Figure 1).

You can select a category preset for creating new documents. These are optimized for their intended uses including:

- *Photo*: Offers common photographic formats such as 4x6, 5x7, 8x10 for high-resolution images
- *Print*: Provides familiar print formats like letter, legal, tabloid, A4 and others in high-resolution
- *Art & Illustration*: Layouts for poster, postcard, square, and video formats in high-resolution
- *Web*: A list common desktop browser window sizes at web-optimized resolution
- *Mobile*: Provides for different device form factors such as iOS, Android, Surface phones and tablets
- *Film & Video*: Select from HDTV, HDV, DCI, NTSC and other video formats

Note: Web, Mobile, and Film & Video use Artboards for layout. Artboards makes it easy to design for websites or apps for multiple devices by giving you an infinite canvas on which you can create designs for different devices and screens. You can learn more about Artboards in the Photoshop guide *How to create multi-screen design comps*.

Before opening the presets, you can modify their settings using the Preset Details pane.

To create a new document using a preset:

1. Start Adobe Photoshop.
The Start workspace opens. If you've previously used Photoshop, your recent files will be shown.
2. Click on the **New** button.
The New Document dialog box opens (**Figure 1**).
3. In the **New Document** dialog, click the **Photo** category tab, and review the blank document presets.

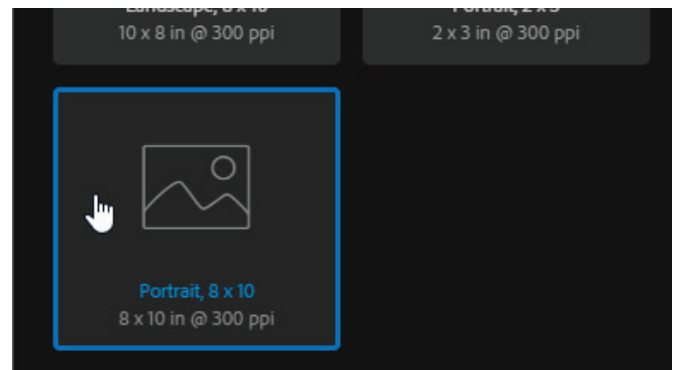


Figure 2 Photo Document preset

4. Select the **Portrait, 8x10** option (**Figure 2**).

Note: You may have to click **View All Presets** + to show all the Photo presets.

(Optional) Change the settings for the selected preset in the **Preset Details** pane on the right of the New Document dialog box.

5. Click the **Create** button.

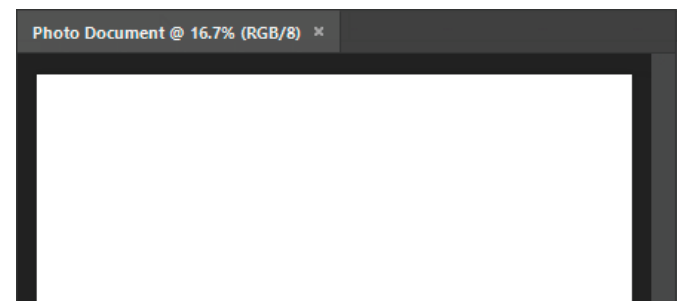


Figure 3 Blank document window

The blank document opens (**Figure 3**).
(Optional) If you need to confirm or change the preset settings after creating the new file, choose **Image > Image Size**.

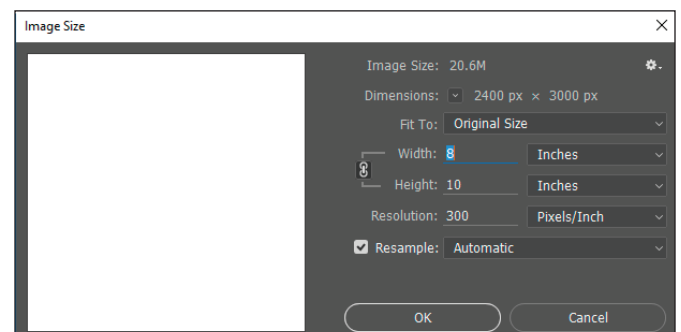


Figure 4 Image size dialog box

The **Image Size** dialog box opens (**Figure 4**).

You can review the information and change specifications for the document including:

- Image size
- Dimensions by width and height
- Resolution

Click **OK** to close the **Image Size** dialog box.

6. Choose **File > Save** if you wish to continue working with the file, otherwise choose **File > Close**.

Creating a new document using templates

Depending on your subscription status, you may be able to view and create a new document using various templates from Adobe Stock. If your subscription account type doesn't permit adding Creative Cloud Libraries and syncing Typekit fonts, then skip ahead to the [Create a new custom document](#) section

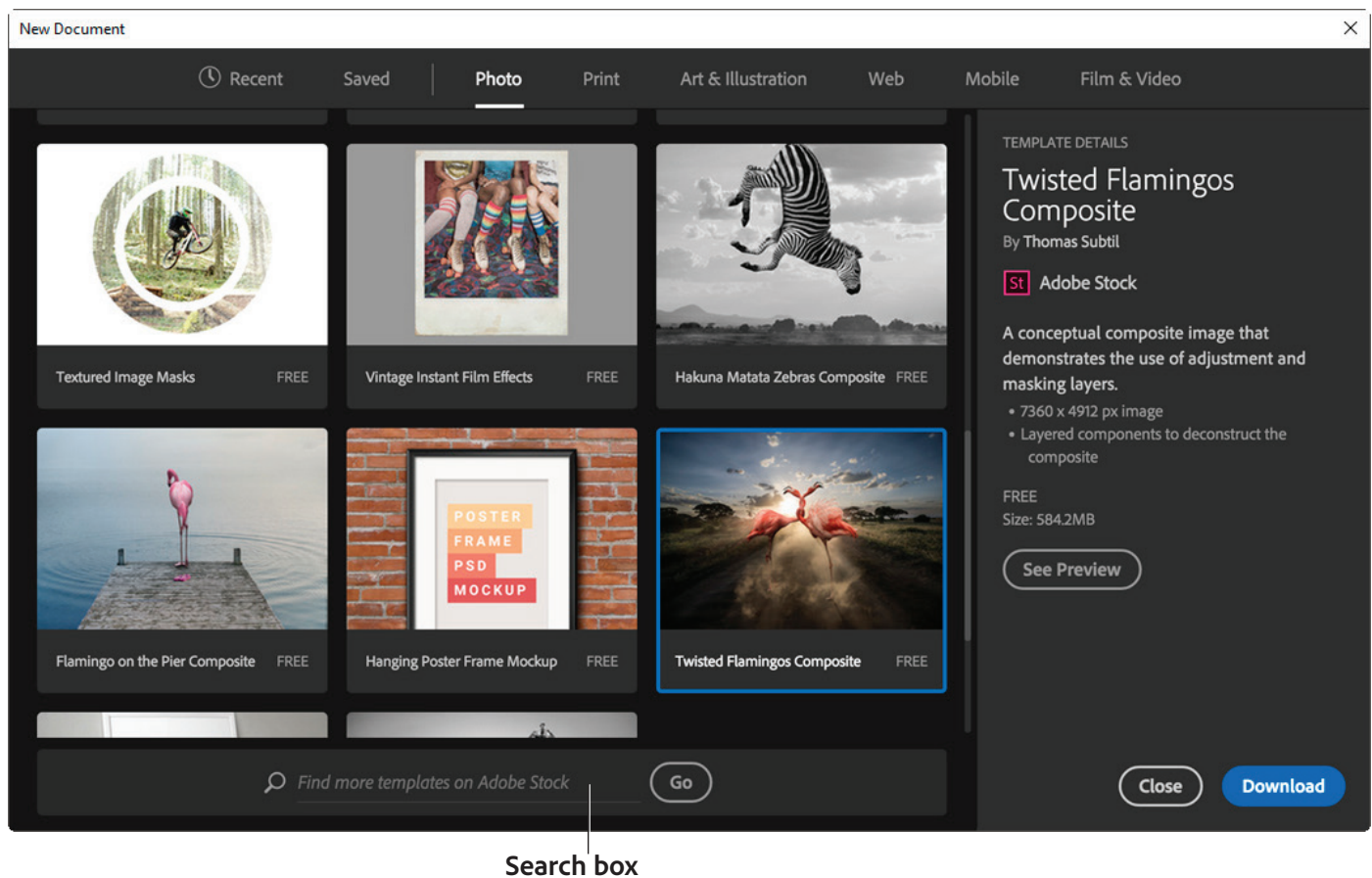


Figure 5 New Document dialog box with Photo Template options

Templates provide inspiration and reusable elements for your documents. Templates are categorized into the same sets as document presets. You can download templates from Adobe Stock that include quality graphics, illustrations and synched fonts from Adobe Typekit right within Photoshop (**Figure 5**). You can then build on these templates to easily create documents that share common settings and design elements.

Aside from the preselected templates from Adobe Stock, you can search for and download numerous other such templates directly from within the New Document dialog. While working in the New Document dialog, enter a search string in the Find More Templates On Adobe Stock box. Photoshop opens the Adobe Stock website in a new browser window for you to explore. Search for more templates and download the one that best meets your project's requirements.

To create a document using a template:

1. Click on the **New** button.
2. In the **New Document** dialog, click a category tab: **Photo**, **Print**, **Art & Illustration**, **Web**, **Mobile**, and **Film & Video**.

3. Select a template.

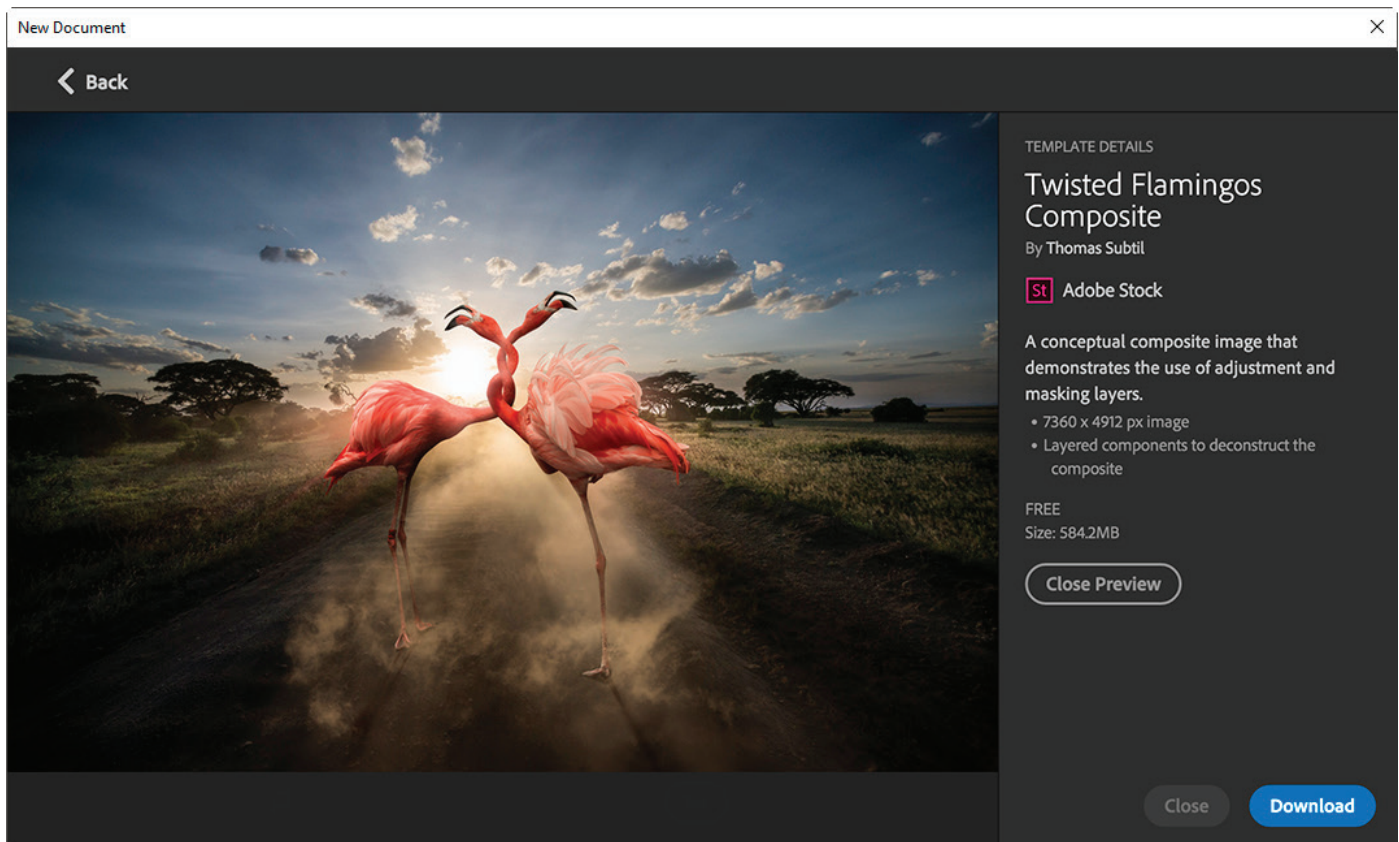


Figure 6 Preview of the template

4. Click **See Preview** to view a preview of the template. A preview is an image representation of a template that you can review and decide if you want to license that template (**Figure 6**).

Many of the selected templates are free for you to and use. These templates must be licensed through Photoshop or other CC desktop apps before you can download them. Other templates are available for purchase.

5. Click the **Download** button.
Photoshop prompts you to license the template from Adobe Stock and process the file (**Figure 7**). After the template has been licensed using asset entitlements or credits in your account, you can open it as a Photoshop document for you to work on.
6. After the template has downloaded, click **Open**. While opening the template, if you're prompted to sync some fonts from Typekit, click **OK**.

You can now work with the open document in Photoshop just as you would work with any other .psd document.

Creating a new custom document

When you create a new custom document in Adobe Photoshop, you use the New Document dialog box to set options such as resolution, color type, and size. Your choices depend on the type of image you're creating and its intended purpose. Although you can change these options later, setting them right at the beginning is best. Sometimes changing the options later can affect the appearance of your image.

To create a new custom document:

1. Choose **File > New**.

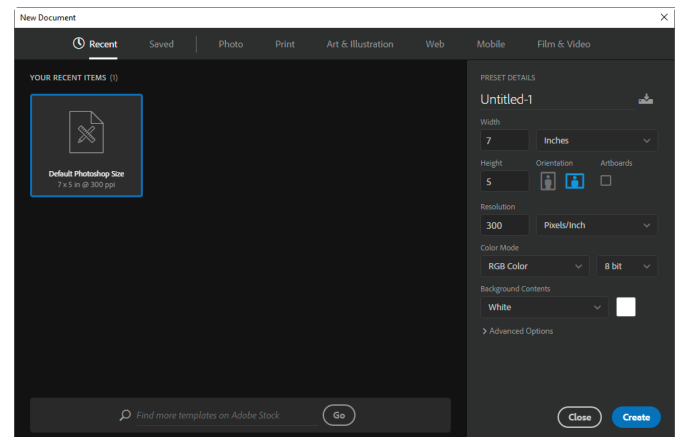


Figure 8 New Photoshop document dialog box

The New dialog box opens to the default **Recent** files tab (**Figure 8**).

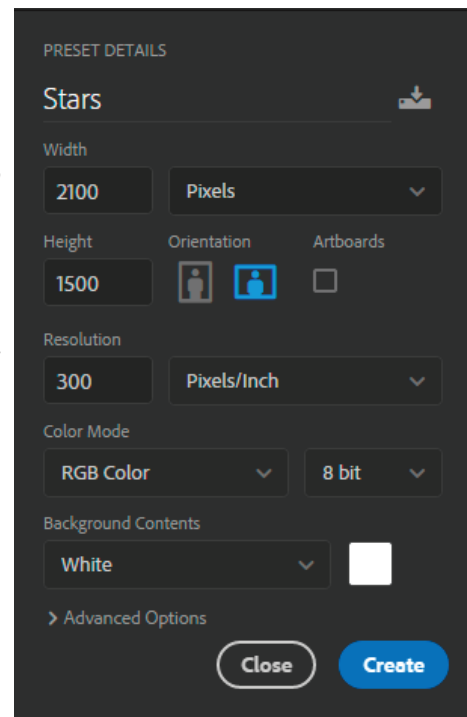


Figure 9 Preset Details

2. In the **Preset Details** pane, give the document a name, such as "Stars" (**Figure 9**)

3. Set a **Width** and **Height** for the images.

You can change the measurement units to pixels, inches, cm or other units by clicking the menu to the right of the Width text box.

4. Choose an **Orientation** for the image, and check the **Artboard** if you wish to use artboards.

5. Enter a **Resolution** for the image.

For an image to be used on the web, 72 pixels/inch is suitable. If you plan to generate images for print, 300 pixels/inch is a good standard. (It's best to set the resolution at the highest you need. If you're planning to create an image for use in print and the web, use 300 ppi, which is what print requires.)

6. Set **Color Mode** to **RGB Color**.

You can also work in **Grayscale** or **CMYK**.

You should generally select CMYK Color only if you know you are using an offset print vendor. Even if you choose RGB at this stage, you can convert the image to CMYK later before sending the image to the print vendor. Bit depth is the number of bits used to indicate the color of a single pixel, in a bitmapped image. Generally, higher bit equals better quality.

7. Set a background color in the **Background Contents** menu (you can change this setting later):
 - **White**: fills the background with white, the default background color.
 - **Background Color**: fills the background with the current background color.

- *Transparent*: makes the background transparent (it appears as a gray checkerboard). This option is useful when you want to create an image for transfer into another background. For example, you might want to create a circular logo with a transparent background so you could later place the logo on a colored background

8. Click **Create**.

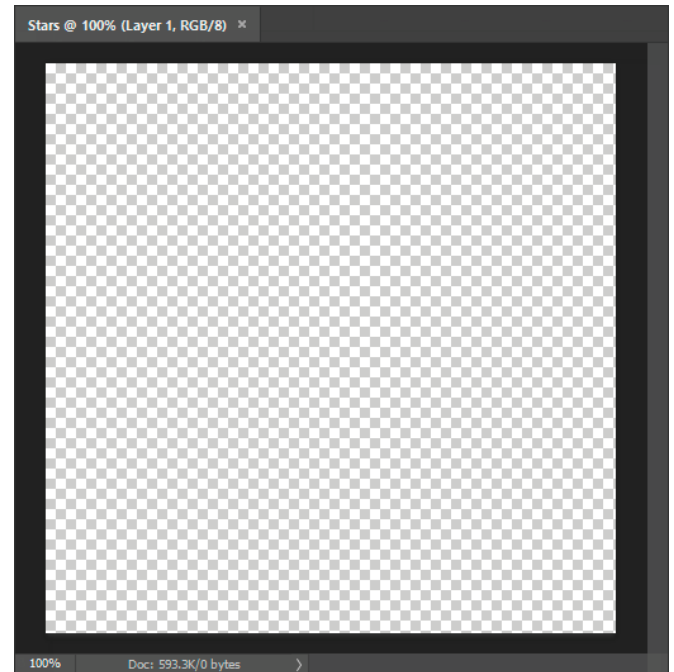


Figure 10 Photo Document preset

The new file opens in the document window, ready to use (**Figure 10**). Be sure to save your file as you work in it.
